

WHEN IN SALT LAKE, CHECK OUT THE BOING! COLLECTIVE

A n old brick house constructed during the early 20th century stands at the corner of 500 E & 600 S in Salt Lake City Utah. A banner for Food Not Bombs is draped over the rickety porch that is cluttered with salvaged furniture. Also on the porch are boxes full of bananas, oranges, corn, and other produce, including a bin of free bread with the anarchy symbol in place of the "A" in bread. The smell of rotting compost complements the decor. It is obvious to anyone passing by that has any familiarity with radical organizations and collective living what this house is. It is the Boing! Collective, founded four years ago to be a community center that offers a radical lending library, free computer lab, and a local musicians' library. A garden is scattered through the front and back lawns, with the intent to provide house members and the community with subsistence through the winter.

The Boing! Collective house is currently undergoing a metamorphosis, as the carpet has been ripped out revealing raw worn hardwood floors. The living room is in disarray as it is being converted into an anarchist coffee shop. There is a map of Salt Lake City near the computer lab that identifies places to harvest free food, and soon to include good dumpster diving spots. The house is occupied by Chris, James and Eric, three young anarchists. "Our focus is to build a tighter knit community of anarchists and others. We want a community we can trust and feel confident in."

who

lived at the Boing! Collective for two years, tells The Red Pill.

James has lived at the Boing! Collective for a year and half and is active with the local Food Not Bombs chapter that operates from the house. Most of the food collected by the organization is donated by Wild Oats, a local grocer. The food is slightly expired, or damaged, or in someway not sellable but still edible. James brings it to the porch of The Boing! Collective on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. Food Not Bombs used to serve people in some of the local parks, but has ceased doing so due to a lack of participation. The last meal served in public by Food Not Bombs was the past May Day celebration.

Liberation Clothing is also headquartered out of Boing! It was started by Mark and Eric who provide silkscreen t-shirts free of sweatshop labor. They donate one-third of the proceeds to nonprofit civil rights organizations. Eric has been involved with Boing! for just over a year and is just moving into the house. At the time he was a member of a band called American Statistic and was invited to hear James play acoustic guitar at the house. Eric likes to build things and is responsible for many of the renovations going on, including the construction of tables and other structural repairs.

Boing! first started as a basic info-shop and had a more closed off feeling, James and Chris recollect. "It wasn't very friendly. It felt more like a monastery." Then it went through a party house faze for a while. The two of them look at the clutter in the living room and remember how different looking it once was. "When I first came here it felt like it was someone's house," says James, emphasizing they would like it to feel that way again soon. The group likes to seek out individuals who are interested in living at Boing! who have drive, ambition, and motivation to build community, and not just someone who is looking for cheap rent. Decision making is a little less formal in the group, compared to other collective houses. Consensus isn't a hard and fast rule and things are often approached through personal conversation basis. "Some people feel that consensus feels kind of alienating, [how we do it] has a more natural feeling. Besides, it is hard to get everyone together at the same time," says Chris.

Write your Congressperson, join the next rally you hear of, boycott a hate radio show's sponsors, just do something. There really is a lot of work to do and it isn't getting done.

MODERN DAY SLAVERY: I'M NOT LOVING IT

Human trafficking victims include illegal immigrants, runaways, addicts, and the homeless. In America, cheap labor is needed by giant corporations supporting and continuing human rights exploitation. Our people are forced into farmwork, prostitution, maid and gardening work, and even drug trafficking. Workers are held captive by their employers through acts of violence including pistol-whipping, beatings, and shootings.

The major food-buying corporations i.e. McDonalds, Taco Bell, and KFC profit from the artificially-low cost of US produce picked by abused workers in sweatshop and slavery conditions. The concerns about the nutritional content of fast food have risen in recent years, along with higher obesity rates among both children and adults. McDonalds has responded to complaints by consumer advocates to make its food healthier by offering more salads and fruit items. This has brought to light, the conditions of those workers that pick and pack that produce.

Workers perform back-breaking farmwork and are a prime example of "over-worked and under-paid." A University of Florida study showed that neither the workers' wages nor the wholesale price of tomatoes have risen for 30 years when adjusted for inflation. The workers make poverty wages, have no right to organize, no benefits, and no vacation time. Our people have been forced into slavery by giant fast-food corporations. The McDonalds Corporation is implementing new rules for improving workers' pay and housing except most of the new program is all ready standard for big growers and is required by law. They've already violated the law for hiring illegals in the first place, how much more damage is going to be done to human rights?

Individuals and groups such as the Coalition of the Immokalee Workers in Florida have successfully fought for higher wages from Taco Bell in 2005. Their wages raised from 40 cents to 72 cents per bucket of tomatoes after a boycott of Taco Bell restaurants. This past March they fight again for higher wages, this time against McDonalds. They are asking McDonalds to require that their tomato producers to pay just 'one cent more' to the workers in the fields. We will see if McDonalds listens.
